One of the great things about being a School Chaplain is that it means that I keep learning new things too. Over the last few weeks some of the children and I have been looking at Christian Symbols. The other week we were looking at Lent symbols and we discovered that one was Praying Hands. I am sure you have all seen just such a picture.

It reminds us that during the forty days in the wilderness which we remember at Lent Jesus was spending time in prayer, to prepare for His ministry. Perhaps too often we think about the temptations and forget this was a time of prayer.

Many of us give up something for Lent, with greater or lesser success. However, it might be worth considering making our Lent a time when we take more time to pray. None of us will be able to spend forty days in the wilderness (tempting though it sounds in our modern world) but we can spare a few minutes each day. Prayer comes in all forms and we certainly don't need any expertise to do it. In fact one of the most helpful ways of praying is simply to sit in silence and think about things that concern us and to remember the blessings that we are thankful for.

Throughout His busy earthly life Jesus took time out to be quiet and pray. I am convinced our society today would benefit so much if more of us followed His example.
